

## OUR VOLUNTEERS

The foundation maintains close contact with our community to inform about opportunities to volunteer in Summit School District classrooms and to participate in the activities of the foundation. EFS relies on our volunteers to help with Trivia Night, reading projects at the schools, including helping at Author Visits and sorting incoming book shipments for Summit Books for Kids and summer reading.

This year, volunteering looked quite different as we had to increase physical distance and could not enter schools. EFS volunteers helped where they could, such as sorting books for Summit Books for Kids and reviewing scholarship applications.


## OUR IMPACT

Over \$800,000 has been raised for public schools since 2010 through fundraising events, grant writing, and donations.

In 2020, the foundation raised \$87,819 through grants, partnerships with Parent Teacher Associations, contributions and fundraising. 90% of all the funds raised went directly to the schools to support teachers and students of the Summit School District:

- \$66,000 for Eileen Finkel Innovative Teacher Awards and STEAM
- \$9,546 for Innovative Reading programs
- \$6,553 for Partnerships for Education
- \$4,147 in Senior Scholarships for Summit High School and Snowy Peaks High School

## EILEEN FINKEL INNOVATIVE TEACHER AWARDS

Summit public school teachers received \$60,000 from the Eileen Finkel Innovative Teacher Awards. The grants were awarded to teachers in a partnership with the Parent-Teacher Organizations at each school, as well as our generous sponsors. "Our educational community is so fortunate to have a joint partnership between EFS and our school's PTSA to support special requests such as mine," said Robyn Cornwell, literacy resource teacher at Summit Middle School.


Teachers were thrilled with the awards. "Yay! This will be so much fun! The STEAM learning in preschool with this Flight Lab will be amazing!" said Julie Willis, Summit Cove Elementary preschool teacher.

Every Summit School District student benefits from an award, as they reached across each school and grade. Awards included:

- Outdoor education learning and flight lab for pre-Kindergarten
- More safety helmets for welding to limit sharing
- Trades program for STEM labs—plumbing, electricity, wood-working
- Outdoor education fitness equipment to get kids off the screens and outside
- Books that include culturally responsive literature
- Technology for distance learning—voice amplifier and headphones
- Lab equipment—magnets, motors, and flight
- Materials for the new physics course at Snowy Peaks Junior/Senior High
- Support for the EVO3 Foundation 2021 drone course for high school students, which is an introduction to drones, coding, engineering, and career opportunities in technology
- Snowy Peaks outdoor education fitness stations

With the Eileen Finkel Innovative Teacher Awards, many ideas may be just a one-time trial. Other ideas grow into long-term programs, such as the Annual Author Visit, as well as robotics and coding which brings STEAM programs to all schools.

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## SCHOLARSHIPS

The **Snowy Peaks High School Scholarship** was established in 2016 with a donation from the F Cubed Foundation. The Scholarship Program is an important part of EFS's support of this innovative junior and senior high school. Snowy Peaks has a 100% graduation rate, and each of those graduates receive a scholarship from EFS.

Scholarships are awarded to **Summit High School** seniors, many of whom will be the first in their family to attend college. EFS directors also serve as mentors to high school students in the Pre-Collegiate Program that serves first generation college students. This scholarship program is made possible by our annual fundraising and generous local donors.

## Lewark Family Scholarship

2020 was the inagural year of the Lewark Family Scholarship, which awards \$1,000 in honor of Ron Lewark to an SHS graduate heading to technical school. Ron Lewark came to Frisco in 1971 and purchased the Texaco, and along with his wife, Donna ran it. Jeff and Larry helped out as they grew up. Ron was a car enthusiast, private pilot, and enjoyed jeeping and snowmobiling. He passed in 2018. Jeff and Scarlett, Larry and Laura, and their children are Summit High School graduates.

## SCHOLARSHIPS

The following scholarship funds were created in 2020 and will be awarded to 2021 graduates:

## David Dreiling Pre-Collegiate Scholarship

This scholarship was created in memory of David Dreiling, a longtime Summit High School teacher and Pre-Collegiate mentor. This scholarship will go to a Pre-Collegiate student to honor David and his distinguished career and also his commitment to students who will be the first in their family to attend college.

## Kerry's Kids Scholarship

This scholarship fund was created in honor of long-time educator and recently retired superintendent Kerry Buhler. Her priorities included implementing more collaboration and planning time for teachers, improving technology infrastructure and overseeing an extensive master facilities planning process that involved major expansions and additions to several district schools. Kerry has been the engine behind some of the district's most innovative reforms, such as piloting the International Baccalaureate's program for all elementary schools and building a student-led, grassroots movement for sustainable, environmentally friendly practices.

Kerry came to the Superintendent role after 13 years as principal of Upper Blue Elementary, which during her time had been twice recognized for student academic achievement with the John Irwin Award. Before that, she taught first and second grades for more than 7 years. "Whenever you saw Kerry, there was always a child running up to hug her, especially during her time at Upper Blue," said Bonnie Ward, EFS vice-chairperson.

## Roaring Summit Valley Scholarship

Joel Gomez is a Summit High School alum and graduated from the Colorado School of Mines in May 2020. He and three friends created the scholarship to award \$500 to a student graduating from their alma maters who will be pursuing a college degree in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, or education.

During high school, Joel's passion was to go to college and be an engineer. "It's always been my dream. I always wonder, how could this design be better? The biggest help I had in achieving this dream was the financial support. Our scholarship isn't very big, but I know that everything makes a difference."

The other three students (two from Valley HS and one from Roaring Fork HS) all wanted to give back to the communities that supported them with scholarships. They want to pay it forward to recognize the help they received and to encourage other students to do the same after they graduate from college. They will award the scholarship to students who have a passion and work ethic to pursue STEM.

## INIOVATIVE READING

Supporting reading and literacy is an EFS priority. Innovative Reading supports the Annual Author Visits and Summit Books for Kids.

The Annual Author Visit is made possible through our generous partners. A community business, Frisco's Ramada by Wyndham, provides hotel lodging each year for the authors. This year most Author Visits were all but cancelled. However, the poet Jovan Mays, made a virtual visit to help Summit Middle School kick off the poetry unit and Poetry Slam. He also visited Summit High School's Winter Arts Festival to give a poetry reading.

Summit Books for Kids increases access to books for children whose families do not have the means to purchase books. The identified children are able to purchase two books each month with their teacher's help. This program increases access to highly relevant, engaging books for children. Developing lifelong readers requires a systems approach to helping children acquire behaviors that support literacy: reading for pleasure, reading a series, knowing favorite authors, and having books of their own at home. The number of books in a child's home is highly correlated to their literacy success, both in the short term and the long term, as they develop into lifelong readers. The program continued this year and provided books to students, both in-person or virtual.

EFS supports schools, parents and students through collaborative partnerships with community and school-based organizations.


Eileen Finkel Innovative Teacher grants are awarded in partnership with the Parent/Teacher Associations of all nine schools.
